

MEETING MINUTES October 30, 2018

CALL TO ORDER: Tristan Torres, ASI Board Chair, called the meeting to order at 1:16 p.m.

He further reported that Bora and Waymire would arrive late to the meeting. Absences were excused by unanimous consent.

Nick Jakel, Tuffy's Basic Needs Grad Assistant, shared information on the Center's events for November. He distributed a flyer which is attached to the minutes. Jakel asked students to consider attending and also to share with their colleges.

EXECUTIVE SENATE SCICC

Demetrius Knight, Chair and Kenneth Wolin, Vice Chair for Sports Club Interclub Council (SCICC), provided an update report on the goals, budget and activities for SCICC. The report is an attachment to the minutes.

Quinones asked where the rivalry game will be held. Knight indicated that he will provide more information after the meeting.

Allen asked for more information on the E-Sports streaming and work with Troy HS. Wolin shared that E-Sports collaborates with and supports the Troy HS E-Sports program. They are hoping that joining SCICC will help them expand their platform and provide greater exposure to include other similar programs.

TIME CERTAIN

Dr. Laurie Roades, Dean for the College of Health and Human Development, provided a presentation highlighting the programs, goals and budget for the College. The presentation is an attachment to the minutes.

Highlights:

- Congratulated the Board for their work and commitment. Asked the Board a few questions and had interaction with students regarding:
 - What do you already know about the College of HHD?
 - O What is one thing you would like to know or wonder about?
- 6,800 students; six departments; School of Nursing; Military Science
- HHD students completed over 600,000 hours of voluntary service in 2017-18
- Overview of centers and institutes, including, Center for Autism, Center for Boys & Men, Center for Cancer Disparities Research, and Center for Healthy Neighborhoods, etc.
- Finalizing HHD Strategic Plan key areas, GI2025, Student Success, Retention.
- Goal for the college is to prepare Students to Meet Today's Healthcare and Human Development Challenges.

TIME CERTAIN

James Donovan, Athletics Director, provided a PowerPoint presentation and provided an overview of the Athletics division and programs. The presentation is an attachment to the minutes.

Highlights:

- Donovan introduced himself and shared that Dr. Meredith Basil will discuss highlights in academics in athletics.
- Shared that Athletics is extremely efficient with budget and operating at a high level.
- Reviewed funding sources state, ASI, self-generated, SSI,
- Dr. Basil Sr. Women's Admin, Director of Athletic Center shared an overview of the academic assessment benchmarks for Athletics. Celebrated 59 graduates last year.
- Student Athlete Life Skills, provides holistic education and support to compliment academic advisement.

Dr. Basil introduced two student athletes, Charles Kelly, Men's Track and Sinai Fatafehi, Women's Track to share their experiences in athletics with the Board.

Kelly thanked the Board for their support, and for all they do for Athletics.
 Shared that his experience has been life enhancing, great for his family, and he shared great enthusiasm for Athletics and the support provided by the team.

• Fatafehi shared that she is a thrower in the Track & Field sports division. She thanked the Board for the support provided to athletics and she shared that the program has made a huge difference in her life.

Donovan thanked the Board for their support.

Stohs asked what throwing is. Fatafehi shared that she throws shot-put which is an 8 lb. ball, and hammer is a ball with a wire, going for the school record.

Oseguera shared that student athletes access all services on campus. She thanked Donovan and the athletics team for referring students to utilize services available. Additionally, she thanked them for supporting dreamers and for their support of all students.

Aldazabal asked for more details regarding diversity and inclusion training in Athletics and how much of the scholarship funds from ASI are distributed to low income students. Basil shared some of the things they are doing with DIRC. Donovan shared there are NCAA rules in regards to scholarships and how the scholarships are distributed to students in need. He further shared that the staff

Quinones asked if the scholarship awards are semesterly or for the academic year. Donovan provided additional details in regards to the frequency and time frame for the distribution of scholarships, and shared that it varies based on the type of scholarship award.

Mark Mumford and Noel Quinones, Directors for the College of Communication (COMM), provided an update on their college. The report is an attachment to the minutes.

Waymire asked how quickly Titan Radio advertisement requests would be processed. Mumford provided an overview and shared that they are generally prompt and responsive.

Abu-Elhaija asked if they had talked to the Vice Chair/Exec clubs in regards to using their dues for budget matters. Quinones shared they had gathered information on the dues and forwarded to the ICC Chair for further follow-up.

Maisune Abu-Elhaija and Jesus Hidalgo, Directors for the College of Education (EDU), provided an update on their college. The report is an attachment to the minutes.

Abu-Elhaija talked about writing a grad student success resolution and she invited other college directors with grad students to join in discussing grad student needs and what steps to take going forward. Hidalgo shared that they are also working to create a survey through Qualtrics.

Linares asked Abu-Elhaija to resend the grad student success conversation email.

Torres shared that NSM would be interested in the grad student conversation as well.

Sherman asked about the goal of the proposed resolution regarding grad students. Abu-Elhaija shared information about some of the challenges that grad students in the College of Education face, such as lack of accessibility to core services since most classes for grad students are at night and most departments are closed during those times. Additional concerns include programming events, food resources on campus, etc. She further shared a desire to have greater input in regards to changes that need to be considered for college representation on the Board. The first step is assessment of the needs, and since it is likely that addressing the concerns will take longer than the remaining term for this year, a resolution would be drafted to document the work that needs to be done.

EDU

Pettis asked if students working toward a teaching credential would be eligible to serve as a director. Abu-Elhaija shared that yes they would be part of the college and would be eligible.

Aldazabal reminded directors about the importance of completing scholarship grading. She also provided an update regarding the ASIP director report, last two weeks in interviews. UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT'S REP

Dr. Tonantzin Oseguera, AVP Student Affairs, provided a written report which is an attachment to the minutes.

Dr. Oseguera reminded student leaders that there are important people coming to talk to the Board throughout the semester. She encouraged Directors to know who is coming to present during the meeting, and to prepare questions. It is important as leaders, if you have questions, ask. Part of being in leadership position is asking tough questions. Be active participants, review the agenda and prepare for the meetings.

Waymire asked about the Presidential search open forum and if there was additional information. Oseguera shared the information that was sent was basically what could be sent out for the process.

Pettis shared that it would be nice to know earlier than a week before the meeting who will be coming to the Board. Tristan shared that the report schedule was provided earlier in the semester, and the updated schedule will be provided.

Linares shared that the Presidential Open Forum, should be on the portal and maybe a text message sent to students. Oseguera shared that some students are charged for text messages so the University is being careful.

Stohs shared that Meng Hall has about 800 seats available, and they expect that most if not all of the search committee members will be present at the open forum.

VICE CHAIR/TREASURER

Abu-Elhaija provided highlights from her written report which is an attachment to the minutes.

- Rebound Scholars Meeting Project Rebound is in need of funds outside of ASI's capability. Tristan asked if Project Rebound was grant funded. Abu-Elhaija shared it is currently grant funded, but the grant will end in June.

La Scala asked if ASI would be looking at partial funding. Abu-Elhaija confirmed, during the budget process will be considering what can be done.

Aldazabal shared that this is something for the Board to consider in light of the fact that other programs receive much more in funding from ASI.




Food Assistance

Gently-worn professional attire is provided to support students' career development and advancement.




Financial Support




ATHLETICS FUNDING SOURCES FY 2017

Maisune Abu-Elhaija, Vice Chair/Treasurer:

Hello everyone,

1. <u>BUDGET SEASON:</u> The Finance Committee did another mock deliberation last Thursday and it went very well. I am confident in their ability to deliberate when we receive budget proposals in the Spring. Next month, Budget Season will pick up for the funding/funded councils because Lionel and I will be holding Budget Orientation. You may receive questions as the ASI representatives on the councils. If you do not know the answer, please feel free to ask me because we do not misinformation to be spread. That is very important!

- 2. <u>ICC VISITS:</u> I have been able to visit the Education ICC, Business ICC, Arts ICC, Mesa Cooperativa, and am currently re-scheduling my visit to the Comm ICC as well as scheduling my visit to the ECS ICC. I have many more to visit and I am looking forward to it! If there is a certain date you would like me to come, please let me know as soon as possible. Otherwise, I will continue to spread out my visits over time.
- 3. **EXECUTIVE SENATE MEETINGS:** Ana and I are in the process of planning our next Executive Senate meeting which will be on Thursday, November 15 from 4-5pm in the Board Room. Remind ALL of your funding and funded councils that these meetings are mandatory if they want to keep their funding. If they have missed two, we will be meeting with the ICC chair and their professional staff adviser. Once they miss three, their remaining funding will be frozen.
- 4. MIDDLE LEADERSHIP ACADEMY: I am part of a research and assessment team that will be meeting with other CSU campuses to discuss equity gaps and solutions on our respective institutions. There will be three conferences I must attend in December, March, and May. As we discuss data, I will share it with you and also seek your input. They were intentional about having an ASI representative because student solutions tend to reach us last.
- 5. MARCH ABSENCE: I have been accepted to present at the National American College Personnel Administrators (ACPA) Conference in Boston, MA from March 1-6. I will also be at the second Middle Leadership Academy conference from Marc 7-9 and then the National NASPA Conference from March 10-13 which means I will be out of the office from March 1-13. I just wanted to let you all know from now.
- 6. **REBOUND SCHOLARS MEETING:** Lionel, Drew, and I met with Project Rebound to see what kind of support they need. It would take well over \$100,000 for us to fully support them—which is not possible for our budget at this time. BUT, I have ways I want us all to help them. They need to have meeting with key stakeholders like Auxiliary Services Corporation, VP Eanes and the Division of Student Affairs, University Advancement, and also to our assistant and college deans. They are unable to do this because they are so spread thin so I am interested in creating an informal committee/group amongst us so we can tackle this together. At the end, if these conversations are not able to provide solutions by June 2019 (when their budget ends), then we can work on a resolution that will call on the university to take care of them ASAP.
