Developmental information

Infants and toddlers love to look up at the sky and one of the coolest things they can observe is the moon, whether at night or during the day. The moon is a great and simple way to introduce children to basic astronomy. You can talk about the stars, moon, sun, planets, etc. Use vocabulary words: crescent, phases, waxing, waning, celestial, constellation, and galaxy. Use phases of the moon to talk about math concepts such as quarter, half and full. Connect ideas about the moon by reading books, saying nursery rhymes or singing songs about the moon, stars and sky.
