DRDP Measure:

SED 1: Identity of Self in Relation to Others Child shows increasing awareness of self as distinct from and also related to others

SED 3: Relationships and Social Interactions with Familiar Adults Child develops close relationships with one or more familiar adults (including family members) and interacts in an increasingly competent and cooperative manner with familiar adults

Age Group: Infants, Toddlers, Preschool

Many studies have shown that infants develop early attachment and recognition of their parents and primary caregivers scents and faces, often understanding that these caregivers can be counted on to meet their needs. Young children also can develop wariness of unfamiliar faces, sometimes crying or moving closer to known caregivers when unfamiliar people are around. While extended family members and close family friends may not have the ability to interact with children on a regular basis, using photos or videos of the special family and friends can help to familiarize children to their faces and work to make them more like family and less like strangers.

Large poster board

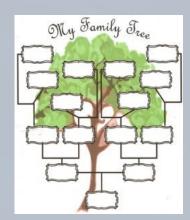
Picture frame outlines (can be drawn, cut out or purchased)
