Developmental information

October and Autumn are fun and familiar themes to help children learn about seasons and nature. Children will begin seeing pumpkins and gourds throughout their neighborhoods, in supermarkets and stores and perhaps in their own homes. You can talk to your child about how pumpkins grow from a seed to a plant with leaves and flowers to a fruit that grows to make its own seeds. Talk about the colors of the pumpkins (orange, red, yellow, green and gray) Cut open a pumpkin and let children explore the insides. Use pumpkin puree and make tasty pumpkin pancakes. If you celebrate Halloween, help your child draw faces on pumpkins, talking about parts of the face.
