

ASI Board of Directors Meeting

Tue Aug 27, 2024 1:15 PM - 3:45 PM PDT

1. Call to Order

Ong, Chair, called the meeting to order at 1:17pm.

2. Roll Call

5. Public Speakers

Members of the public may address Board of Directors members on any item appearing on this posted agenda or matters impacting students.

Austin Ysais, ASI Assistant Director of Programs and Engagement, welcomed the board to the fall semester and highlighted two upcoming events. On September 12th, All Day ASI will take place, featuring giveaways, food, and a concert. A large turnout is expected. The Farmers Market will return early in the semester.

JP Gale, Director of the Student Recreation Center, welcomed everyone back to school and expressed excitement about the busy start at the Recreation Center. He provided updates on new programming, noting that feedback gathered last year led to the addition of 52 group fitness classes this semester. New classes include ballet, Bollywood dance, women's-only introduction to strength training, and others. The first Intramural games will begin September 23rd.

Amy Parker raised critical issues during their address, challenging the Board to take a stronger stand on several concerns. They criticized the previous ASI Board for failing to prevent tuition hikes and for not taking meaningful action on divestment. Parker accused the university and Chancellor's office of pushing policies that suppress student protest rights. Parker also questioned ASI's financial management, citing past issues such as credit card fraud and questionable expenses, and urged the board to address these concerns before demanding more student fees.

6. Time Certain

a. 1:30 pm: Freedom of Speech, Emily Whitt, Director of Student Life & Leadership

Dr. Vincent Vigil, Senior Associate Vice President & Dean of Students, and Emily Whitt, Director of Student Life & Leadership, covered key points regarding free speech policies at the university. The discussion encompassed First Amendment, university policies, and strategies for supporting free speech on campus.

Dr. Vigil outlined the new time, place, and manner policy, which is guided by the First Amendment and the CSU system-wide policies, emphasizing content neutrality and reasonable restrictions. Amplified sound policies were also highlighted, restricting usage to specific times and locations to avoid disrupting academic activities.

Whitt introduced the Quad Squad, a group trained to support free speech events on campus. The squad is prepared to respond to various events, including those hosted by non-CSUF visitors, registered student organizations, and non-registered groups.

Whitt explained the Quad Squad's procedures, from informing and assessing situations to taking action as needed, including managing free speech activities that involve hateful speech, which the CSU cannot restrict solely based on its content.

The report concluded with an emphasis on understanding and applying the university's free speech policies while ensuring that the campus remains a space conducive to learning and respectful dialogue.

Ong, Chair, opened the floor to questions and point of discussion.

Ramirez-Rivera expressed concerns about the Quad Squad's presence at events, noting that students often find their role unclear. She asked how the Quad Squad could better communicate their purpose to the student body. Whitt responded by explaining that Quad Squad members wear name tags and position themselves on the outskirts of events to support students when needed. Whitt also mentioned that they are open to suggestions on improving communication. Vigil added that presentations like the current one help raise awareness about the Quad Squad.

b. 2:00 pm: Dr. David Forgues, VP Student Affairs

Dr. David Forgues, VP of Student Affairs, began by sharing that the Student Affairs division, consists of about 400 staff members, and serves a student population of 43,000. He highlighted a slight increase in enrollment and retention this year. The division has developed a new vision to "empower every Titan toward the future of their dreams," which Forgues believes resonates with their mission. He noted recent events, including the grand openings of new spaces for the TAP center and Project Rebound, and emphasized the importance of having spaces where students can connect and be empowered.

Forgues outlined three key requests for his division:

- 1. Tell the Story: Highlighting the compelling stories of students' achievements both on and off campus.
- 2. Work Together: Encouraging collaboration among various departments and student groups to enhance support and effectiveness.
- 3. Support All Students: Ensuring that all student voices are heard and supported, including reviewing and improving the EP program based on feedback.

He shared a personal story about a student, who overcame challenges and went on to achieve significant success, illustrating the positive outcomes they hope to see in all students. Forgues concluded by expressing his commitment to serving and collaborating with the students and staff, inviting them to reach out to him anytime.

Ong, Chair, opened the floor to questions.

Ramirez-Rivera inquired about alternative ways to provide feedback for the EOP session, particularly for commuter students. Forgues responded that the feedback process will include surveys, Zoom options, and in-person sessions. Experts will be visiting in early October to review the EOP program and provide recommendations. They will gather feedback through various methods to ensure inclusivity.

Edwards sought clarification on whether the upcoming meeting would be available via Zoom. Forgues was uncertain but expressed openness to broadcasting the session online if possible, noting that in-person interaction is preferred for clarity and dialogue but acknowledged the need for broader access.

Walkley asked about the structure of the upcoming session, wondering if it would involve a Q&A or public comment format. Forgues explained that he would start with an update on the feedback process and proposed changes, then open the floor to questions and feedback. He emphasized his commitment to addressing shortcomings and working collaboratively moving forward.

c. 2:30 pm: Greg Pongetti, Arboretum & Botanical Garden at CSUF

Greg Pongetti, the Living Collections Curator, discussed the Arboretum's self-supporting status, highlighting that ASI has been a crucial supporter since the 1970s, funding student positions at the front kiosk and as student gardeners. He detailed the Arboretum's fundraising efforts, including facility rentals, tree sponsorships, plant and fruit sales, donations, grants, and memberships. The Arboretum sells harvested fruit, donates surplus to the Food Pantry, and composts food waste from the pantry, which is used around the Arboretum.

Upcoming events include the California Native Plant Sale on November 1-2, with follow-up sales in December and January. A new online plant ordering system is being piloted. There will be a fruit tasting event in September, featuring rare fruits. The Arboretum is also developing the Friends Terrace event facility, expected to be completed by the year's end. Pongetti shared a conservation project involving the Arboretum's Torrey pine trees in collaboration with the San Diego Zoo's plant conservation department.

Justin Villasenor, the Arboretum's Academic and Environmental Programs

Coordinator, highlighted the Arboretum team's role in educational programming and strengthening ties with the CSUF community. He mentioned recent participation in

student orientations and upcoming involvement in Discover Fest. The Arboretum is hosting Tai Chi classes, faculty-led student visits, and the E3 Internship program, which involves interdisciplinary teams working on horticultural and environmental projects. Villasenor also noted upcoming student-led projects, including a soil chemistry analysis and the creation of interactive educational devices.

Ong, Chair, opened the floor to questions.

Ong asked about concerns related to new campus constructions near the Arboretum and student involvement in safeguarding it. Pongetti addressed the concerns, particularly about the teaching farm, mentioning mitigation efforts and ongoing air quality and soil monitoring.

Rubio inquired about the types of fruits that will be available for the upcoming tasting event. Pongetti listed sapotes, lucuma, jamun, jujube, pears, and pomegranates as possible options.

S. Morales asked if a date for the fruit tasting event had been set. Pongetti confirmed that no date had been finalized and advised checking social media and subscribing to the Arboretum's e-mail newsletter for updates.

BOD 013 24/25 (Ong-m, Rubio-s) A motion was made and seconded to approve the fall 2024 Board of Directors and Committees Meeting Schedule.

Ong, Chair, yielded the floor to Dr. Dave Edwards, Executive Director, to provide details of the resolution.

Edwards explained that the resolution for the start of the term involves approving the meeting schedule for the Board and Committees. This year's schedule is straightforward with no significant changes. The Board will meet every other

Tuesday throughout the semester. The Governance and Finance Committee and the Programs and Facilities Committee will meet on the alternative weeks. The Audit Committee will meet a few times as needed. The schedule and dates for all meetings are included in the packet.

Ong, Chair, opened the floor to questions and point of discussion.

There were none.

BOD 013 23/24 (Ong-m, Rubio-s) Roll Call Vote: 16-0-0. The Fall 2024 Board of Directors and Committees Meeting Schedule was adopted.

BOD 014 24/25 (Ong-m, Rubio-s) A motion was made and seconded to approve the ASI Resolution appointing Juan Salguero and Alexa King to serve as Lobby Corps Commission Coordinators, effective immediately through May 31, 2025.

Megan Hannoun, Chief Governmental Officer, reviewed the resolution to appoint the 2024-2025 Lobby Corps Commission Coordinators. She mentioned that three applicants were considered, and she, along with her colleagues, interviewed them using a standardized set of questions. The selected candidates, Juan Salguero and Alexa King, were noted for their resilience, assertiveness, passion, and leadership qualities. Both have experience as congressional interns and participation in the highly regarded moot court program.

Ong, Chair, opened the floor to questions and point of discussion.

Jarvis pointed out that the moot court program is elite but not exclusive and is ranked as the number two program in the nation.

Brown emphasized the importance of Lobby Corps members, especially with the upcoming election.

J. Morales encouraged others to recommend strong candidates for open ASI positions to continue to enhance the team.

Ong expressed admiration for the applicants, noting their strong alignment with ASI's values as outlined in their application.

BOD 015 24/25 (Ong-m, Rubio-s) A motion was made and seconded to approve the ASI Resolution appointing Hafsa Farooqui to serve as the Environmental Sustainability Commission Director effective immediately through May 31, 2025.

Haneefah Syed, Chief Campus Relations Officer, reviewed the resolution and selection process on behalf of Hafsa Farooqui, who was absent. Hafsa, a fifth-year student at CSUF with a strong commitment to environmental sustainability, was interviewed in the spring by J. Morales and S. Morales under Rebecca's supervision. Hafsa's dedication to making the campus environmentally sustainable aligns with her future career goals as an engineer. Syed emphasized Hafsa's assertiveness, compassion, and teamwork, expressing excitement about her potential to create lasting initiatives.

Ong, Chair, opened the floor to guestions and point of discussion.

- J. Morales further highlighted Hafsa's determination and well-structured game plan, expressing confidence in her ability to succeed in the role.
- S. Morales praised Hafsa's professionalism and passion, which she witnessed during both the interview and their previous collaboration.

Ong also expressed being impressed by Hafsa's research on the previous position holder's work and her preparation for the role.

 - i. Executive Officers Report
 - J. Morales, President, expressed excitement for the new year and encouraged collaboration. He highlighted a focus on meeting with campus partners, developing new events, attracting freshmen to student government, and staying organized academically.
 - S. Morales, Vice President, shared experiences from summer training and meetings. Goals include promoting Discoverfest, increasing student engagement, and filling open positions in the Community Engagement Commission.

Hannoun, Chief Government Officer, noted a busy summer with orientation and CSA events. She focused on legislative and system-wide affairs, working on a tabling series initiative, and engaging with the civic engagement working group. Upcoming projects include simplifying the ballot and creating a voting guide video.

Ramirez-Rivera, Chief Inclusion and Diversity Officer, reported on ongoing recruitment for her commission and upcoming projects, including a family-based petition clinic in collaboration with the Titan Dreamers Resource Center.

Syed, Chief Campus Relations Officer, mentioned that she is currently onboarding and interviewing for two commissions. She emphasized the importance of connecting with administration and staff, and she is looking forward to confirming commissions and starting new projects.

Alvarez, Secretary, provided no specific updates, but expressed gratitude and enthusiasm for the new school year. He encouraged continued hard work and mutual support.

iii. Vice-Chair Report

Rubio, Vice-Chair, stated that there were no major announcements yet, focusing on upcoming meetings and supporting the board throughout the year.

iv. Chair Report

Ong, Chair, welcomed everyone back, emphasized checking GroupMe and emails, and reminded about updating calendars. He mentioned upcoming placements and scheduling one-on-one meetings. Ong announced a need for two additional board members for the Strategic Planning Committee. He also noted that public comment contact information will now be included for direct follow-ups.

11. Announcements/Member's Privilege

Brown invited everyone to the Black Titan Experience event on Thursday from 5:00 to 7:30 PM.

S. Morales announced gathering on Friday from 1:00 to 4:00 PM and upcoming EOP updates.

Daga reported positive responses from freshmen orientation and a meeting with the Dean planned for Friday.

Ramirez-Rivera invited everyone to the Titan Dreamers Resource Center's 10-year anniversary on October 17th at 5:00 PM.

Edwards urged prompt responses to scheduling requests for introductory meetings with college Deans.

Ngo promoted the Center for Leadership's Buddy Program for freshmen, highlighting mentorship and scholarship opportunities.

Ong encouraged sign-ups for DiscoverFest tabling slots and mentioned distributing candy bags. He announced the addition of contact information for public comments and called for volunteers for the Strategic Planning Committee.



FIRST AMENDMENT



TIME, PLACE, & MANNER

The Constitutional guarantee of speech free from government restraint, does not preclude reasonable restrictions unrelated to content; SCOTUS recognizes in its opinions that the constitutional guarantee is not absolute.

Time, place and manner restrictions are contentneutral limitations imposed by the University on expressive activity.

TIME

May include designations on the length, frequency, or time(s) that such activities occur. Must be reasonable and appropriate.



PLACE

May include specifications on the areas of campus that can be used, including those that require a reservation or impede fire lanes.



MANNER

Do not limit content, but instead relate to the form of communication, such as volume so as not to affect academic mission of the University.



CSUF AMPLIFIED SOUND POLICY

- Amplified Sound Policy
- The use of amplified sound that impedes or is disruptive to the regular or essential operations of the University (which include but are not limited to teaching, study, research, administration, meetings and/or other authorized and permissible use of University facilities); infringes on the rights and privileges of others; damages University property or endangers the safety of others is prohibited.
- "Amplified sound" is any sound enhanced through any device however powered that magnifies sound, including but not limited to microphones, cell phones, bull horns and megaphones.
 - The use of amplified sound during an activity may only occur from 12:00 pm until 1:00 pm. Any use may not impede with any previously scheduled event.
 - O The use of amplified sound may only occur in the following locations: Becker Amphitheatre, the Main Quad, and the Humanities and Social Sciences Quad.
- Sound Exception Request form
 - There is a form that can grant exceptions and approval to use amplified sounds outside the 12-1 pm hour. However, use of amplified sound cannot impede or disrupt the regular or essential operations of the University

QUAD SQUAD STRATEGIES

PREPARATION

- Meet regularly with the student coordinators
- Understand concerns regarding any potential free speech activities at the event
- Develop a plan with the student coordinators to prohibit disruption
- Consult with campus stakeholders (as needed) for support

PROCEDURES FOR CSUF STUDENTS

INFORM

- Student Life & Leadership is informed about the visitor or event occurring on campus
- Staff informs student(s) their right to free speech activity
- Reminds student(s) of expectations associated with time, place, and manner

ASSESS

- Student Life & Leadership will assess the situation, reiterate policies as needed
- Assess crowd size, area of campus where the speaker/event is occurring, and situational awareness

NOTIFY

• UPD, AVP Dr. Vincent Vigil, and Student Life & Leadership will be notified via text communication

ACTION

• If additional support is needed, SLL will contact Directors to identify which Quad Squad trained staff are available to assist in monitoring the speaker/event

WHAT ABOUT SPEECH EXPRESSING HATEFUL FEELINGS?

What does hateful speech sound like?

Speech that offends or insults groups based on race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, disability, or other traits. They are words that are hurtful, emotionally harmful, and psychologically stunning.

Is speech expressing hateful feelings legal?

The CSU as a governmental entity is prohibited by the First Amendment and the California Constitution from restricting speech simply because it is hateful.



ARTICLE IV. OF CSU NONDISCRIMINATION POLICY

Freedom of expression is not an absolute right. It coexists with other rights and the need for public order and safety.

Not every act that may be offensive or insulting constitutes Discrimination or Harassment, as defined by law and this Nondiscrimination Policy.

At the same time, all members of the campus community should recognize that the manner in which they choose to express themselves has consequences and that freedom of expression includes a responsibility to acknowledge and respect the right of others to express differing opinions. Conduct that violates this Nondiscrimination Policy, including statements that constitute Discrimination, Harassment, Sexual Harassment, Retaliation or Stalking, is not protected by academic freedom or freedom of expression.





1. How would you describe the purpose and role of the University Affairs and Environmental Sustainability Commissions?

University Affairs is tasked with Providing academic opportunities for students in order to help them grow in their professional lives; everything from diversity and inclusion, to housing, to financial aid falls under university affairs. The environmental sustainability commission is tasked with education of environmental issues and Institutionalizing sustainability practices that can be into day- to-day life.

2. How do you plan to motivate, mobilize, and utilize the University Affairs Commission to advocate for issues on campus? Please be descriptive and specific.

One major problem that I have noticed between many students- in and out of my college- is a lack of education on certain forms they need to fill out for financial aid, transferring of classes, deadlines for academic advising, etc. A helpful tool would be: at the beginning of each semester before being able to register for classes making watching certain trainings mandatory for students. Similar to how Title IX is mandatory for students in order to begin their classes (to ensure they actually watch them), there could be a number of training sessions for students to choose from to stay informed on how to maximize their academic life at CSUF. One example is considering the vast number of transfer students who do enter into our university, many of them unfortunately do not understand the financial or academic matters that they need to take care of before their brief time here. If these trainings were mandatory, iit could help them in their academic successes.

3. How do you plan to effectively support and oversee the Environmental Sustainability Commission? Please provide specific plans and/or ideas.

From numerous previous leadership experiences, I have noticed that delegation, prioritization, proactivity and communication are of utmost importance. In order to lead a commission- in order to lead anyone - any good leader knows that all the responsibility is on themselves. This seems like an overstatement (as in, a good leader should be doing all the work) but, frankly, the difference of a micromanager and good leader are the following: is a good leader should be able to do their portion of the work and also delegate very well, check in frequently to observe progress, denote the personal and professional work styles of anyone working underneath them, announcing frequent and relevant updates, and creating a set calendar much in advance and consistently sticking to it. Most importantly, treating anyone working for them as a person and understanding that they have other commitments from their family, friends, school, work, and hobbies; recognizing that balance must be maintained and punctuality on deadlines must be prioritized. So, if a member of the commission is unable to complete their tasks for a few days, I completely understand but would need an early advance notice in order to divide up the work fairly to meet deadlines. Two- way communication is key.

4. What goals and ideas do you have for the position and its areas of responsibility, and how would you improve upon what the position is doing now or has done in the past?

I would like to build upon Cameron's line of communications that has been developing through the open comment form for students to send in any questions or comments from UAC. I really admire that by Bridging the communication gap the team developed a way to reach out to students, instead of students always having to reach out on their own behalf. Again, I am a proponent that leadership draws good followers so being a good leader, naturally followers (the CSUF student body) will be more proactive and inviting to ask questions.

To me the Above three are very simple: getting to know fellow Titans. The nuance is drawn from understanding their hardships, backgrounds, lifestyles, plans for the future, personal goals, hobbies, and career aspirations. 
