VP Forgues provided an overview of the Division of Student Affairs and the events and activities for the spring semester. A copy of the presentation is appended to the minutes.

VP Frogues welcomed everyone to the new semester and informed the Board that the search for a permanent Student Affairs VP has closed. There will be opportunities to participate in the Open Forum.

After receiving student feedback, the EOP program is being reformatted. Last year, EOP admissions took place in June. Applications will be processed in the next couple of weeks which will give students an opportunity to participate in Summer Bridge. Interviews for a counselor and admissions position will be taking place. A permanent Director will be hired next Fall.

Campus enrollment is strong. This Spring has the highest enrollment in CSUF history. The admissions team has been challenged to notify perspective students of their Fall 2025 admission in advance instead of March.

President Rochon sent students an email welcoming them to the new semester that included links to the new website including resources for students that were experiencing immigration concerns. Immigration Rights resource cards were distributed.

Discover Fest was successful and it was highly attended. The newly renovated Titan Dinning Hall will re-open tomorrow.

Chair Ong, opened the floor to questions. Rubio thanked VP Forgues for always coming to the Board with a great smile while showing his passion for the students. Morales, S. also thanked VP Forgues for his role in improving EOP and for helping student voices be heard.

b. 2:00 pm: Kimberly Shiner, VP University Advancement
 Kimberly Shiner, VP University Advancement provided an overview of the Division of
 University Advancement. A copy of the presentation is appended to the minutes.

VP Shiner focused on the day-to-day support of students. This fiscal year, the Philanthropic Foundation has raised \$11 million dollars and the goal for the year is \$26 million. Donations can come as gifts in-kind, legacy gifts, or cash gifts. This year \$4.6 million was distributed to support scholarships, student and faculty program support.

In Fall 2024, University Advancement partnered with the Black Student Union and the Black Titan Alumni Network to host Black Titan experience for students. Additionally, they supported the International Friendship Club with an Alumni Mixer, the 4th Annual First-Generation Mixer, the 5th Annual Navigating your Black Identity in the Workplace

The Children's Center (CC) has been established for 53 years. The current facility has been open for 11 years. The CC serves about 200 children ranging from 3 months to 6 years, and they provide internships to 60-90 students each semester.

Based on budgetary concerns, the minimum wage increase, rising cost for food and materials and other factors, a 2% increase in the Children's Center user fees for 2025-2026.

Ngo shared that the resolution discusses proposed changes the Student Recreation Center (SRC) due to minimum wage increases, operational costs and program structure. Ngo, yielded to Kathleen Post, ASI, Chief Financial Officer to review the proposed changes to the SRC User Fees. A copy of the presentation is attached to the minutes.

Postal shared that the SRC provides inclusive recreational opportunities to inspire development and well-being of our campus community. Last year the SRC served over 17,000 unique student visits. Most of the programs are free to the students and they're funded through the campus Union Fee. Some specific programs and services require members to pay a marginal fee. The SRC employs approximately 145 students and is open seven days a week for 116 hours a week, while classes are in session.

Guiding factors like minimum wage, comparable market rates for similar activities and venues locally, operational costs, program and class atructures, square footage and comparison to other CSUs, served to justify the proposed changes. The SRC is proposing a standardized student staff support rate of \$19 per hour. Additionally, the faculty, staff and offered at \$35. New staff has joined ASI. One staff member retired and recruitment for the position will begin soon. Security cameras will be installed throughout ASI facilities.

The ASI scholarships application is open. Based on a recommendation from general counsel on the university side, the Undocumented Student Scholarship is not offered this semester.

Student Programming and Engagement is hosting the next Beyond the Conversation event taking place on February 20th with Daveed Diggs. A Nicki Minaj Niche Night will take place on February 25th.

The expansion of the Communication, Marketing and Design department is completed.

Ong opened the floor to questions. Olivares asked why the Undocumented Scholarship was not offered this semester. Edwards explained that there was a concern that the criterion for the scholarship is based on citizenship. Scholarships are funded by student fees and basing an award on citizenship status could be a violation of federal law. ASI is seeking legal opinion and both federal and state law will be reviewed.

Introduction

Itemized Costs

Per attendee:

- \$206 estimated airfare from Los Angeles, CA (LAX) to Chicago, IL (ORD)
 - Calculated with Spirit 1679 and American Airlines 1964 using Expedia
 - Departing 11:30 pm February 27 from LAX, 7:04 pm March 2 from ORD
 - Airfare costs may increase on a day-to-day basis; we will book as soon as funding is authorized and we know we can be reimbursed to minimize the costs
- \$125 registration fee
 - If our registration fee can be paid on or before January 26, it is only **\$100**
 - Breakfast and lunch are included in the fee

As a group:

- \$349 shared hotel expense (+ taxes and fees; estimated 10.25% sales tax)
 - The hotel is at a discounted rate from YDSA National and is shared three-ways

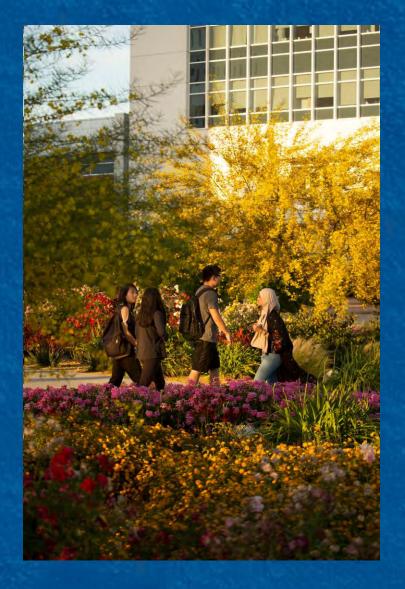
We continue to partner with the CSUN EOP Director and team for training and admissions support.

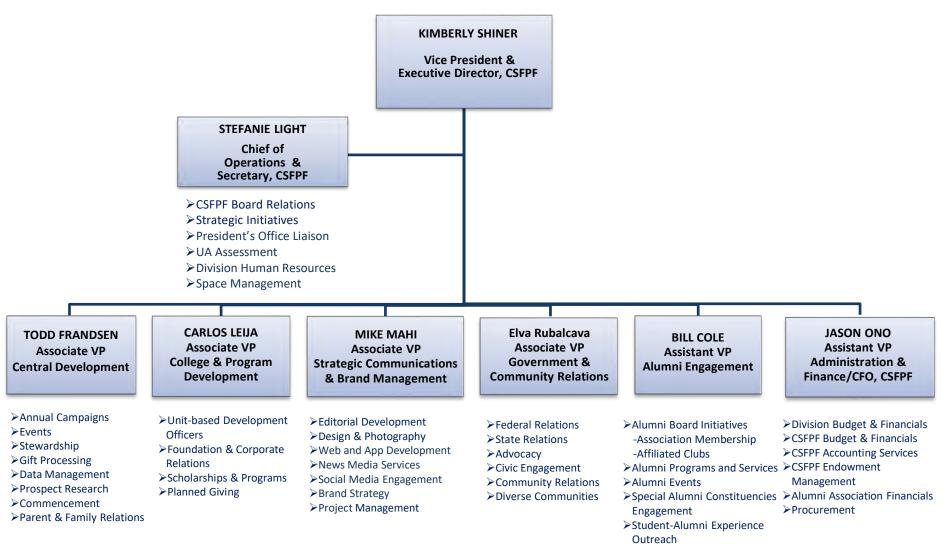

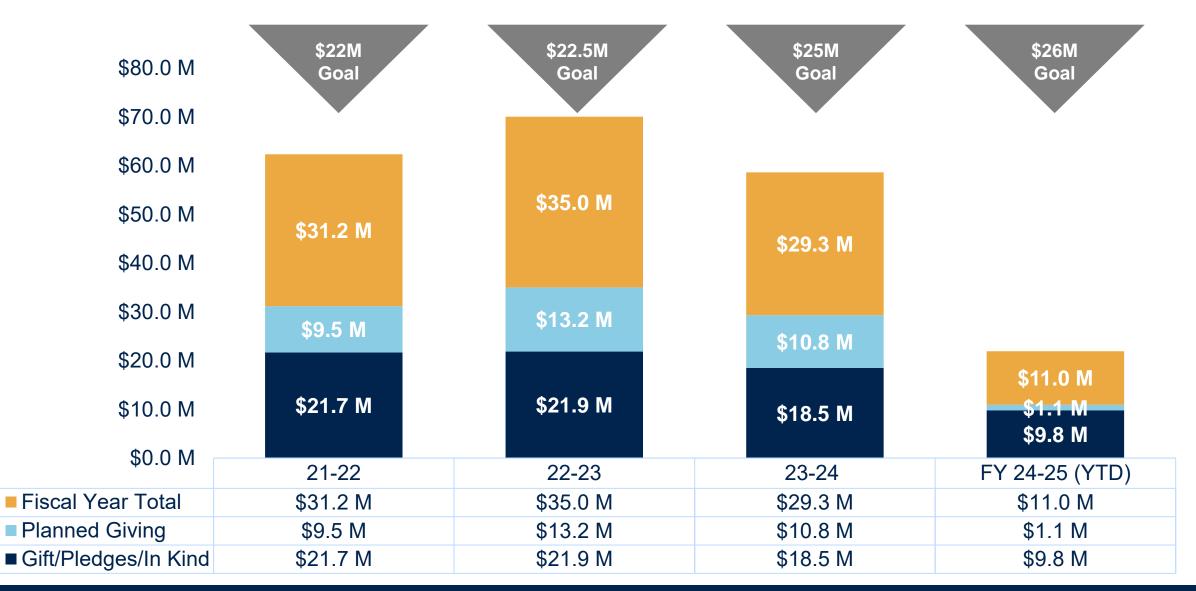

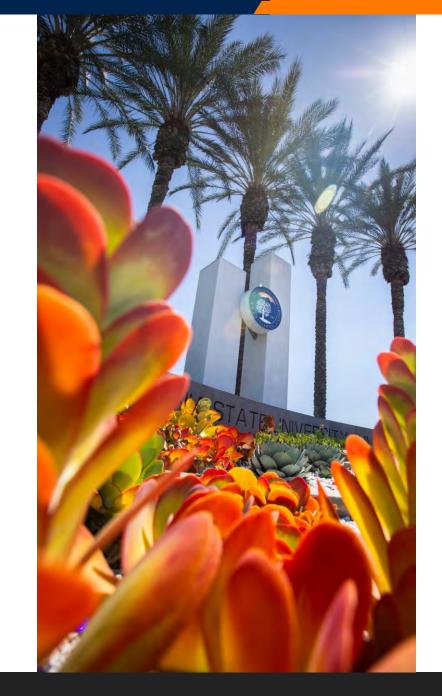


FY 2024-25: YOY Gift Comparison as of 02/02/2025



Impacts of Fundraising

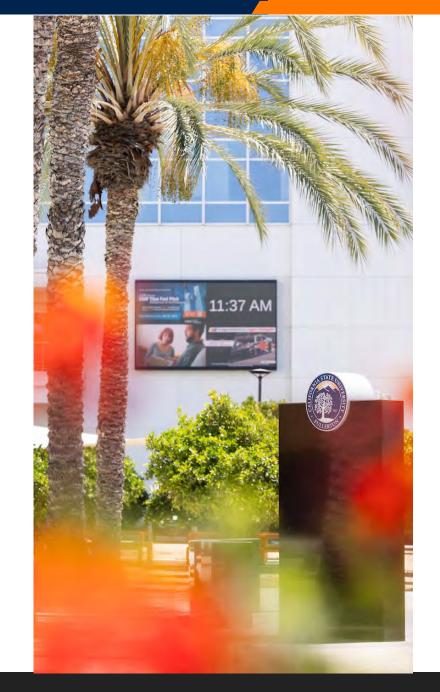
- Axiom Materials donated \$148,000 in aerospace grade carbon fibers needed to build the ECS Formula Team racing car.
- An update to an estate gift booked initially at \$2.6 million for the Lasquadro LGBTQ Resource Center has realized \$300,000 more than initially stated, making this a nearly \$3 million gift for the center.
- Kaiser Permanente donated \$75,000 to the ASI food pantry, which will be used to purchase refrigerated lockers and culturally and dietaryspecific foods.



Cal State Fullerton Philanthropic Foundation

• Endowment Fund value was \$152.1 million as of January 2, 2025.

 The endowment spending distribution rate was increased from 3.0% to 3.5%, resulting in a spending distribution of \$4.6 million, the largest in Foundation History.

The Office of Alumni Engagement connects students with alumni for mentorship, resources, and support for student organizations.

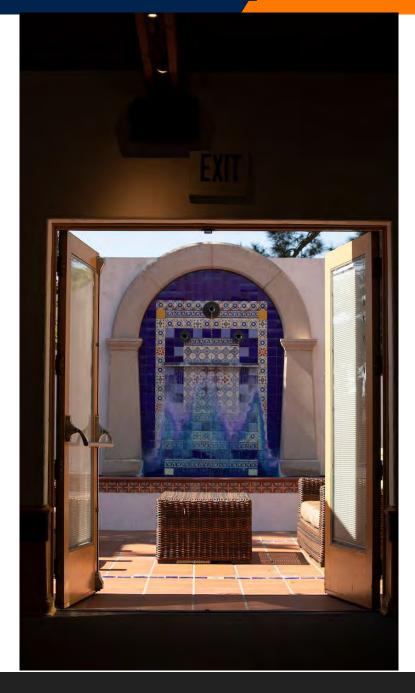

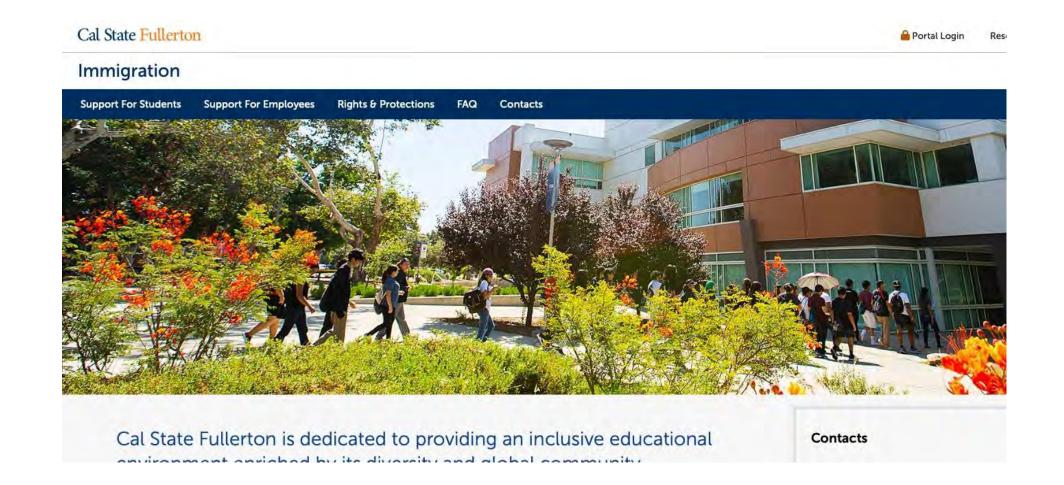

 - Provided services for 200+ children (ages 3 months to 6 years).
 - Employed and provided internships for 60–90 CSUF students per semester.

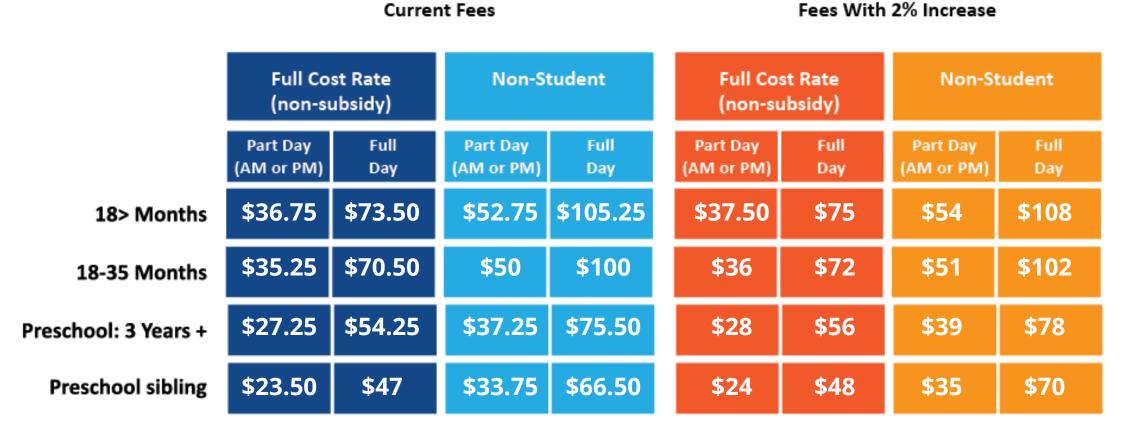


Specific Fee Information

WHEREAS, the Associated Students Inc., CSUF (ASI) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that operates as an auxiliary organization of California State University, Fullerton (CSUF); and

WHEREAS, ASI is governed by the ASI Board of Directors, which sets policy for the organization, approves all funding allocations to programs and services, and advocates on behalf of student interests on committees and boards; and

WHEREAS, ASI oversees and operates the ASI CSUF Children's Center to support CSUF student parents as they pursue their education, and to support CSUF staff and faculty parents as they work and teach; and

WHEREAS, the Children's Center has been supporting CSUF student parents by providing affordable on campus childcare for over 53 years. Additionally, the Center provides CSUF students and interns the opportunity to gain classroom work experience and professional development for future careers; and

WHEREAS, last year the Center provided services for over 200 children ages 3 months through 6 years old and employed and provided internships for 60-90 students each semester; and

WHEREAS, the ASI Board of Directors establishes the Children's Center operating budget and approves programs and services; and

WHEREAS, the Children's Center is facing several fiscal obstacles including minimum wage increases on staffing costs, increased inflationary costs including food and materials, ensuring competitiveness and quality without requiring additional ASI resources, and decreasing birth rates and other external considerations; and

WHEREAS, the Children's Center proposes a 2% fee increase to subsidized non-student families, full tuition paying student families, non-student families, and ASI student family tuition rates; therefore let it be

RESOLVED, the ASI Board of Directors approves a proposed 2% Children's Center rate increase for the 2025-2026 fiscal year. The fee change has no impact on student families that are grant funded; and let it be finally

RESOLVED, that this resolution be distributed to the applicable ASI departments for appropriate action.

Summary Student Recreation Center

- The SRC provides inclusive recreational opportunities to inspire the development and well-being of the campus community.
- The SRC had **17,489** unique students use the facility in the 2023-24 school year, with **396,926** total visits.
- Most programs and services of the SRC are free to students. They are funded by ASI (Campus Union Fee).
- Some specific programs and services with higher costs require members to pay a marginal fee.
- The SRC employs 145 students and is open 7 days a week, for 116 hours a week while classes are in session.

WHEREAS, The Associated Students Inc., CSUF (ASI) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that operates as an auxiliary organization of California State University, Fullerton (CSUF); and

WHEREAS, ASI is governed by the ASI Board of Directors, which sets policy for the organization, approves all funding allocations to programs and services, and advocates on behalf of student interests on committees and boards; and

WHEREAS, in fiscal year 2023-24 the TSU hosted 4,998 events, TBB, Esports, and the Drop-in-Art teams provided over 165 free student programs, and over 800,000 hourly guests visited the TSU; and

WHEREAS, the TSU regularly assesses operating costs in support of events, meetings, and programs in the Titan Student Union; and

WHEREAS, the Titan Student Union proposes an adjustment to the University Conference Center rates as follows:

- Simplify the rate schedule for UCC reservable spaces from 8 client categories to 4 categories (ASI/Student Orgs; CSUF Affiliates; Private Use; and Off-Campus);

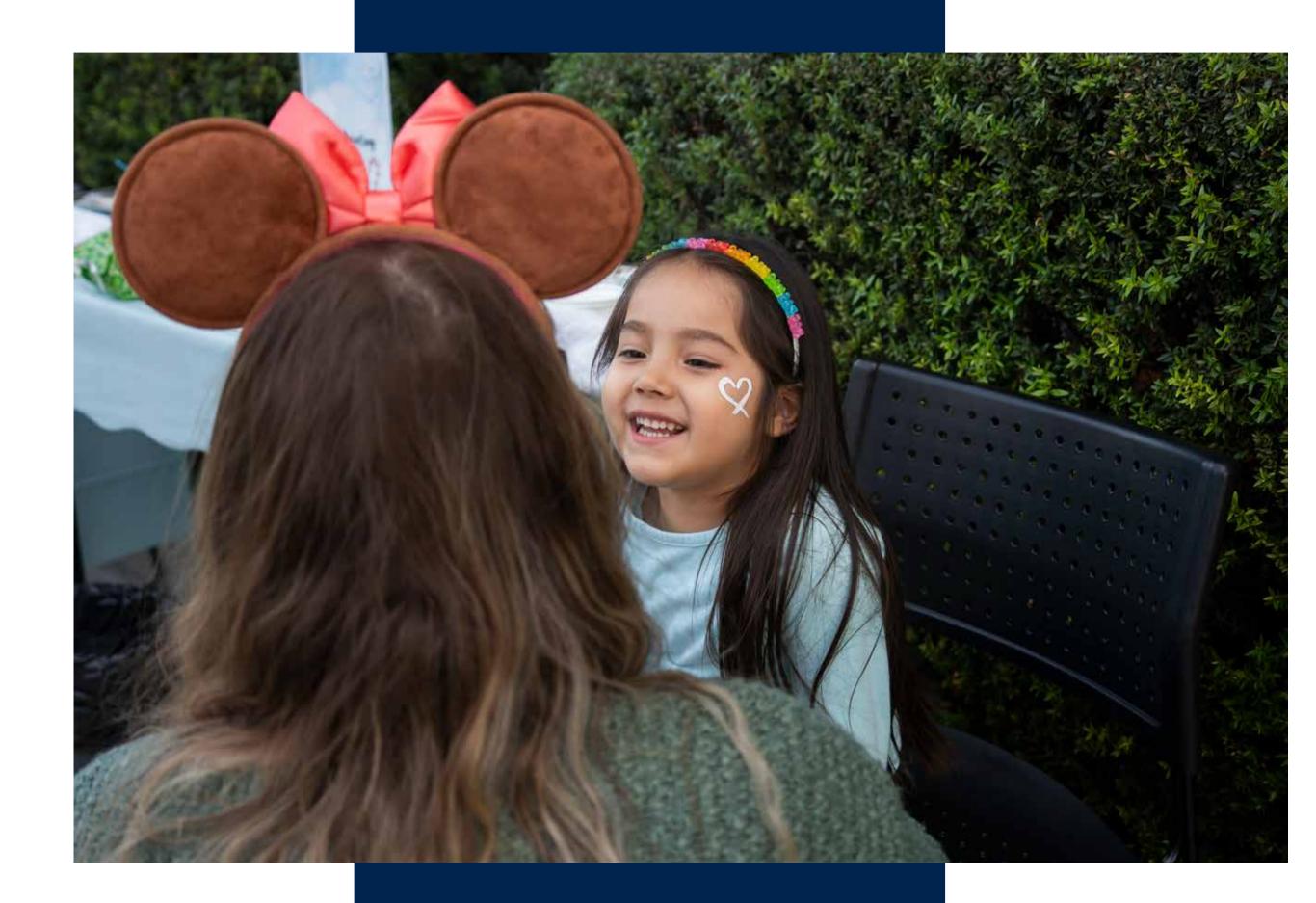

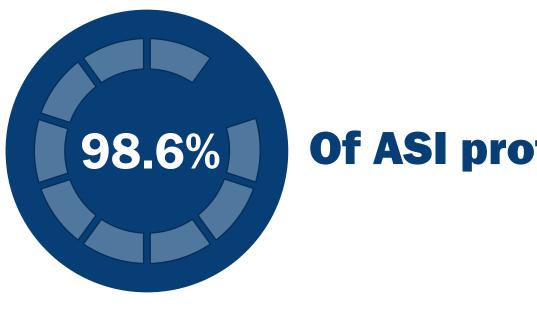
