5. Public Speakers

Austin Ysais, ASI Director of Programs and Engagement highlighted upcoming events including the all-day ASI event on Thursday with activities, departmental showcases, and a Flick and Float Movie Night, as well as the first annual Fall Concert on October 4 with details to be announced soon. He also shared

that the *Beyond the Conversation* series would feature director John M. Chu on September 18 and that the Farmers Market would begin on September 9, encouraging members to attend and participate.

7. Time Certain

A. 1:30pm: Freedom of Speech (Presenters: Emily Whitt, Director of Student Life & Leadership)

Chair Morales yielded to Emily Whitt.

Emily Whitt, Director of Student Life & Leadership joined by Dr. Vincent Vigil, Sr. Associate Vice President for Student Affairs, shared DiscoverFest materials, and presented on freedom of speech on campus. They explained key elements of the First Amendment, university policies, and the “time, place, and manner” (TPM) guidelines, emphasizing that restrictions remain content-neutral. They discussed the role of the Quad Squad in monitoring free speech activities, including handling outside visitors, student rallies, and events, as well as procedures for preparation, monitoring, and response. They also addressed the distinction between free speech and harassment, encouraged students to know their resources for reporting or support, and reminded leaders to care for themselves, represent ASI responsibly, and promote positive outcomes of free speech.

Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

Syed asked how hateful images, rather than speech from a physical person, could be addressed under the CSU nondiscrimination policy and whether there was a difference in how such situations were handled.

Whitt replied that hateful images on campus were usually displayed by individuals holding signs, which was permitted as long as they did not set up structures like sandwich boards or tables without a reservation under the TPM policy. She explained that the Quad Squad would monitor such situations by positioning themselves around the images, informing students of what to expect, and offering alternate routes, while also reminding the individuals of campus policies when applicable.

Ryals asked what policies applied when larger organizations, such as social media groups with large cameras, held spontaneous free speech events on campus, and what students should be aware of in those situations.

Whitt and Dr. Vigil explained that outside groups and student organizations are both allowed to host events on campus, but they follow different approval processes student groups work with Student Life and Leadership, while off-campus groups coordinate with the Events Office, which ensures permits and compliance with TPM policies. They emphasized that the university’s allowance of these events does not mean endorsement of their messages, and students are not obligated to participate.

Romero asked what the Quad Squad would be made up of, whether it would consist of employees, students, or administrators.

Whitt replied that the Quad Squad is made up of staff from the Division of Student Affairs and Strategic Enrollment Management, about 35 members in total, who are identifiable by visors and name tags. She explained they receive de-escalation training from the mobile crisis team in CAPS, extensive policy training with scenarios, and refresher sessions each semester, while students can also attend free speech refresher workshops hosted on Zoom and advertised on Titan Link.

Chair Morales asked what upcoming concerns were on their radar, noting his own concern about Gavin Newsom’s gerrymandering efforts in November, and wondered what situations might arise that would require implementation of the policy.

Whitt and Dr. Vigil said protests often arise around current issues like redistricting, immigration, and Gaza, so they anticipate more activity this year. Their team monitors social media, unregistered groups, and nearby campuses to stay prepared and respond effectively.

B. 2:00pm: Dr. Khalilah Doss, VP of Student Affairs & Strategic Enrollment Management

Chair Morales yielded to Dr. Khalilah Doss.

Dr. Doss introduced herself and shared updates about the new joint division of Student Affairs and Strategic Enrollment Management, emphasizing a vision of cultivating a transformational, student-centered environment. She highlighted expectations of civility, respect, and “radical hospitality,” encouraging genuine presence and compassion in student interactions, while stressing unity through the idea of “one band, one sound.” She reminded the board that their name and actions are their brand, representing over 45,000 students, and urged them to treat each other with humanity. Drawing on her own experiences, she emphasized wisdom, collaboration, and the importance of showing up for the most vulnerable students. Finally, she encouraged ASI to lean into their ideas and partnership with her division, assuring them their voices and collaboration are vital.

Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

Ryals asked for more information on the objectives of Strategic Enrollment division.

Dr. Doss explained that Strategic Enrollment Management was always part of Student Affairs but had never been formally named. By naming it, they’re clarifying ownership and identity, bringing together areas like Financial Aid, Titan Hub, and Admissions to highlight their collective and collaborative work, even though the work itself hasn’t changed.

C. 2:15pm: Dr. Cecil Chik, AVP Engagement & Belonging, John Beisner, Executive Director Risk Management & Compliance, & Anthony Frisbee, University Police Chief

Chair Morales yielded to Dr. Cecil Chik, John Beisner, and Anthony Frisbee.

Dr. Chik, John Beisner, and Chief Anthony Frisbee introduced the campus Immigration Enforcement Protocol, stressing that UPD officers never ask about immigration status since it is illegal in California and that they do not enforce federal immigration laws. Because misinformation often spreads on social media, the campus created updated protocol cards to clarify proper responses, emphasizing the steps “Stay calm, Inform, Report.” The card explains that if you see immigration activity but aren’t approached, you should immediately report it to UPD by phone, 911, or text, while if you are directly approached, you should state that you are not authorized to provide information, refer agents to one of three designated campus officials, and notify UPD or Risk Management.

They underscored that rapid reporting is vital, as it enables UPD to verify agents’ presence, maintain safety, and gather details to activate campus leadership and legal support, while also reminding the community that free immigration legal services are available to students, staff, faculty, alumni within two years of graduation, and their families for matters such as DACA renewals, visas, green cards, and deportation defense an urgent resource since detained individuals can be moved out of state within hours, limiting California-based lawyers’ ability to intervene.

Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

Quock asked about the best way for students or the group to share the immigration protocol information with others.

Dr. Chik advised sharing the information via any available channels like social media, websites, or directly to students, and noted the QR code on the protocol card links to a shareable PDF.

Beisner mentioned that they had printed about 6,000 protocol cards in English and Spanish and instructed anyone needing more to email him at extension 7475 for prompt delivery.

Ryals asked whether federal immigration agents were allowed to enter spaces like the library, staff or resource centers, department offices, and classrooms without a warrant or subpoena.

Frisbee explained that agents legally need a warrant to enter non-public campus spaces, but sometimes don't show one. He emphasized calling UPD or Risk Management immediately so authorities can intervene and document the situation for legal follow-up.

Montano asked whether in the case of increased immigration enforcement on or near campus, students, staff, and faculty would be updated in real time and what the current protocol for notifications was.

Dr. Chik replied that the campus updated its communication approach over the summer, emphasizing timely reporting via the protocol card and ensuring students, staff, and faculty receive transparent updates to make informed safety decisions.

Komiya asked if the campus had plans to make the protocol information more permanently visible, such as posting the QR code and phone numbers on posters or in high-traffic areas, since not all students carry the card with them.

Dr. Chik explained that the campus distributed around 6,000 protocol cards, held multiple presentations, and used videos to share information, aiming to inform without increasing risk. The goal was to reduce fear, encourage reporting, and have students and staff help spread the protocol across camp.

He noted that the Board meets every other Tuesday, with the Finance and Governance Committees meeting on Thursdays of the same week, other committees meeting on the off weeks, and the Audit Committee meeting as needed throughout the semester, and he asked members to review the schedule before approval.

Chair Morales yielded the floor to Riya Jain, Chief Campus Relations Officer, Tyler Gibbs, Chief Governmental Officer and Ava Montano, Chief Inclusion and Diversity Officer.

Jain introduced Maaz Qureshi as the newly elected Director for the Environmental Sustainability Commission. She highlighted his civil engineering background, extensive field experience, involvement in campus clubs and internships, strong leadership and communication skills, and deep understanding of sustainability issues, emphasizing that he would play a key role in making the year successful.

Montano introduced Samdruddhi Kadam, a second-year international graduate student, as a new member of the SJEC Commission. She noted that Kadam would be the first graduate student on the commission, bringing a fresh perspective, focusing on accessibility for commuters, international students, and grad students, and aiming to leave a positive impact through initiatives and events.

Gibbs introduced Leah Allari, a fourth-year political science major, highlighting her involvement in moot court, strong understanding of politics and policy, and experience interning in a congressional office in D.C. He noted she would be a valuable addition as a commissioner.

I. Executive Officers

• **President ~ Haneefah Syed**

Syed shared an overview of her summer activities, emphasizing her work connecting with the new VPSA and other campus partners, and her involvement with the Cal State Student Association (CSSA). She highlighted opportunities for students to engage in statewide advocacy, contribute to the CSSA policy agenda, or serve as student representatives on system-wide committees.

• **Vice President ~ Juan Salguero**

Salguero shared that over the summer he and Syed stayed busy with meetings, interviews, orientations, and trainings, including filming informational videos about scholarships, which went live on August 18th. He highlighted his goals for the upcoming week: meeting with the finalized Community Engagement Commissioner team, making a strong impression in the Academic Senate, and establishing a solid foundation as student representatives. He encouraged everyone to support one another and stay grounded in their pillars as motivation to serve students and constituents throughout the academic year.

• **Chief Campus Relations Officer ~ Riya Jain**

Jain shared that she attended summer trainings and plenaries, finalized her commissioners, and focused on promoting the November 4th election and early CHES

application marketing, while building relationships to share legislative information across colleges.

- **Chief Governmental Officer ~ Tyler Gibbs**

Gibbs shared that he attended all required trainings, held meetings with the UAC Commission to understand their goals, and worked on projects including Earth Month/Campus Sustainability Month and the U.S. Bank competition.

- **Chief Inclusion & Diversity Officer ~ Ava Montano**

Montana shared that she attended summer trainings, onboarded her commissioners, supported Project Rebound orientation and UJIMA Smart Start events, and collaborated on pamphlets for Discovery Fest and resource center acronyms to help incoming students navigate campus.

C. Board Leadership Reports

- **Chair ~ Joe Morales**

Chair Morales welcomed everyone back, appreciated their summer efforts, and emphasized collaboration with Haneefah and Juan to make the year successful. He encouraged members to share ideas and questions, noting upcoming committee meetings and temporary workload increases due to two vacancies. He also highlighted the importance of wellness initiatives, transparency regarding the recent fee increase, and offered office hours after the board meeting for anyone to touch base or ask questions.

- **Vice Chair ~ Mahak Ahmad**

Ahmad welcomed everyone back for the fall semester and the first board meeting, encouraged intentionality in their work, reminded them that there's a lot to absorb, and reassured everyone that they are not alone, offering her support throughout the year. She announced the first Governance Committee meeting for Thursday, August 28th, encouraged those who couldn't attend to touch base with her, wished everyone a strong start to the semester, and summarized her summer activities, including student government trainings, a one-on-one with Dr. Edwards and the college dean, participation in a student government coordinator interview, and attending her first CSSA conference.

- **Secretary ~ Luca Romero**

Romero expressed excitement for the new semester, highlighting his eagerness to work with the board and executive team, emphasizing keeping students as the "North Star." He shared that he would serve on the Facilities, Programs, and Auxiliaries (SVC Board) committees and stressed his commitment to being a student voice while promoting collaboration and transparency, aiming to share committee information broadly so everyone stays informed.

- **Treasurer ~ Shay Quock**

Quock shared a reminder about student questions regarding the \$40 campus union fee tied to the ASI Wellness Initiative and emphasized the importance of transparency when addressing these inquiries. He noted his participation in trainings, CSSA events, and other meetings, and mentioned that he would chair the Finance Committee while serving on the CSUF Alumni Association and VEBA Trust Committee. His goals included fostering trust and transparency with the student body regarding ASI's budget.

11. Announcements & Members Privilege

Chair Morales opened the floor for announcements.

- Salguero reiterated that scholarships are now live and emphasized that while he chairs the scholarship process, all student leaders should help spread the word so every student has the opportunity to apply. He highlighted that the Wellness Initiative added \$105,000 in scholarship

funding, significantly supporting tuition and living expenses. So far, 44 scholarships have been submitted and 42 are in draft. He encouraged anyone with questions about scholarships to reach out to him or answer them if able, and mentioned that posters and flyers would be shared to help promote awareness across campus.


- Jarvis emphasized the importance of showing grace to others, reminding students to extend it to faculty, peers, and themselves. He noted that faculty should set reasonable deadlines and that students should advocate for fairness when needed. He framed the campus community of roughly 50,000 Titans as a family, encouraging everyone to treat each other with respect and understanding to foster a supportive environment.
- Chair Morales highlighted two main points: first, she urged everyone to actively advocate for the Wellness Initiative, emphasizing how it's transforming campus through \$105,000 in scholarships, increased club funding, and upcoming events like the fall concert. She stressed that the \$40 fee increase is covered by financial aid, making these benefits accessible to all students. Second, she encouraged full participation in meetings, reminding everyone that they represent the student voice and should speak up for constituents who aren't present, ensuring their perspectives are heard.
- Chair Morales yielded to Dr. Edwards.
- Dr. Edwards congratulated everyone on completing their first fall semester meeting and announced that he will be the entertainer for the fall concert. He introduced two new staff members: Alora Walker, the new office coordinator for student government, and Karen Turner, the new ASI Project Manager who will focus on the Student Wellness Initiative and campus construction projects. He thanked the student leaders for transparently communicating about the first phase of the Wellness Initiative fee increase despite university billing delays. Finally, he offered personal support, inviting board members to reach out for check-ins, coffee, or conversations whenever needed.



FIRST AMENDMENT

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

TIME, PLACE, & MANNER

The Constitutional guarantee of speech free from government restraint, does not preclude reasonable restrictions unrelated to content; SCOTUS recognizes in its opinions that the constitutional guarantee is not absolute.

Time, place and manner restrictions are content-neutral limitations imposed by the University on expressive activity.

TIME

May include designations on the length, frequency, or time(s) that such activities occur. Must be reasonable and appropriate.



PLACE

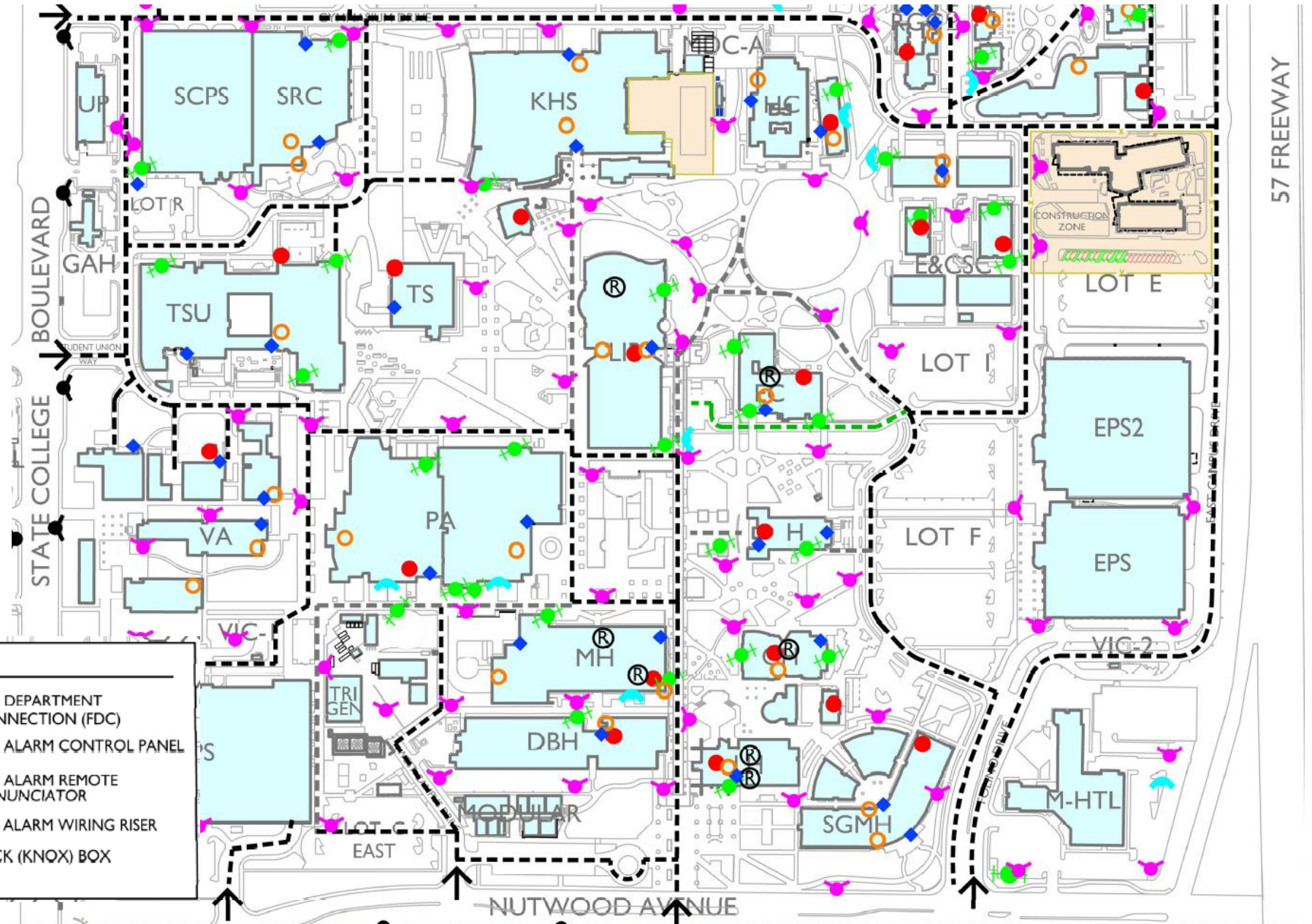

CSUF AMPLIFIED SOUND POLICY

- Amplified Sound Policy
- “Amplified sound” is any sound enhanced through any device however powered that magnifies sound, including but not limited to microphones, cell phones, bull horns and megaphones.
 - The use of amplified sound during an activity may only occur from **12:00 pm until 1:00 pm**. Any use may not impede with any previously scheduled event.
 - The use of amplified sound may only occur in the following locations: Becker Amphitheatre, the Main Quad, and the Humanities and Social Sciences Quad.
- Sound Exception Request form
 - There is a form that can grant exceptions and approval to use amplified sounds outside the 12-1 pm hour. However, use of amplified sound cannot impede or disrupt the regular or essential operations of the University

QUAD SQUAD STRATEGIES

PREPARATION

PROCEDURES FOR CSUF STUDENTS

INFORM

- Student Life & Leadership is informed about the visitor or event occurring on campus
- Staff informs student(s) their right to free speech activity
- Reminds student(s) of expectations associated with time, place, and manner

ASSESS

- Student Life & Leadership will assess the situation, reiterate policies as needed
- Assess crowd size, area of campus where the speaker/event is occurring, and situational awareness

NOTIFY

- UPD, AVP Dr. Vincent Vigil, and Student Life & Leadership will be notified via text communication

ACTION

- If additional support is needed, SLL will contact Directors to identify which Quad Squad trained staff are available to assist in monitoring the speaker/event

WHAT ABOUT SPEECH EXPRESSING HATEFUL FEELINGS?

What does hateful speech sound like?

Speech that offends or insults groups based on race, color, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, disability, or other traits. They are words that are hurtful, emotionally harmful, and psychologically stunning.

Is speech expressing hateful feelings legal?

The CSU as a governmental entity is prohibited by the First Amendment and the California Constitution from restricting speech simply because it is hateful.

ARTICLE IV. OF CSU NONDISCRIMINATION POLICY

Freedom of expression is not an absolute right. It coexists with other rights and the need for public order and safety.

Not every act that may be offensive or insulting constitutes Discrimination or Harassment, as defined by law and this Nondiscrimination Policy.

At the same time, all members of the campus community should recognize that the manner in which they choose to express themselves has consequences and that freedom of expression includes a responsibility to acknowledge and respect the right of others to express differing opinions. ***Conduct that violates this Nondiscrimination Policy, including statements that constitute Discrimination, Harassment, Sexual Harassment, Retaliation or Stalking, is not protected by academic freedom or freedom of expression.***

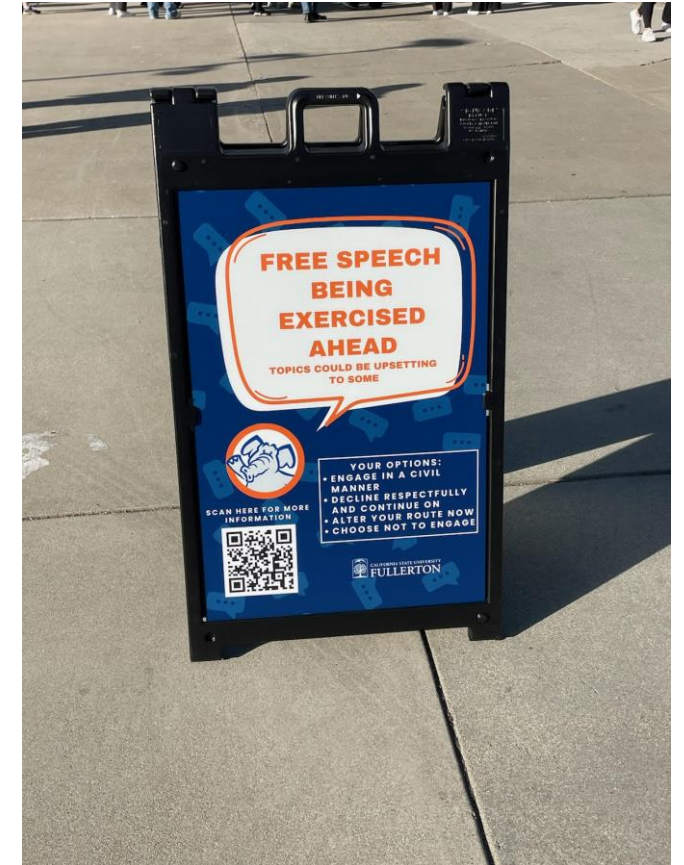
