5. Public Speakers

Members of the public may address the Board of Directors on any item appearing on this posted agenda or matters of importance to Cal State Fullerton students.

There were two public speakers.

- JP Gale, Director of the Student Recreation Center (SRC), introduced the new Memberships and Outreach Coordinator, Ignacio Valencia, noting that he previously worked at Cal Baptist University as the Memberships and Operations Coordinator for four and a half years, and welcomed him to the team.
- Rebecca Hesgard, ASI Director of Student Government announced that Ashley Zazueta, a former student leader and current ASI employee, would be joining the team as the new Student Government Coordinator and shared that more details about her advisory role would follow.

7. Time Certain

A. 1:30 pm: Jim Donovan, Director of Athletics

Chair Morales yielded to Jim Donovan, Director of Athletics.

Donovan thanked everyone for their continued support of athletics, noting his 14 years of involvement and emphasizing ASI and intercollegiate athletics as key leadership environments on campus. He highlighted recent events, including the successful Think Pink Breast Cancer Awareness Night, and shared that student-athletes achieved a record cumulative GPA of 3.11. Donovan also mentioned that over 70 former Titan baseball players have played in the major leagues, with three currently in the postseason, and introduced senior volleyball player Maya Tillman as the first student-athlete speaker.

Mya Tillman, senior setter and team captain, discussed the volleyball team's rebuilding year under new head coach Nicky Cannon, emphasizing leadership, accountability, and mental toughness. She mentioned workshops, alumni mentorship, and upcoming events the home opener on October 9 and Senior Night on November 22 while expressing gratitude for continued support and scholarships.

Donovan thanked Tillman for representing student-athletes well and introduced the next speaker, Mikiah Negrete, a senior baseball player and leader of the pitching staff who earned All-Conference Honorable Mention in the Big West last year. He also noted that they graduated from the same high school, 40 years apart.

Mikiah Negrete, a senior economics major and transfer from the University of San Diego, thanked ASI for its strong support of athletics and shared that he feels more valued at Cal State Fullerton. He highlighted head coach Jason Dietrich's focus on grit and perseverance, the positive influence of alumni, and expressed gratitude for the funding and resources that help student-athletes grow on and off the field.

Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

B. 1:45 pm: Dr. Su Swarat, Senior Associate Vice President for Institutional Effectiveness and Planning

Chair Morales yielded to Dr. Su Swarat, Senior Associate Vice President for Institutional Effectiveness and Planning.

Dr. Swarat provided an update on the university's *Fullerton Forward* strategic plan, launched in 2024, outlining its five goals focused on student success, engagement, faculty and staff development, campus capacity, and operational efficiency. She shared that 97% of 209 reported outcomes are on track, with 40% already met. Highlights included record-high enrollment of over 45,000 students, strengthened partnerships with community colleges, new graduate programs, and implementation of the Titan Degree Planner. She also noted progress in faculty recruitment and development, major campus construction projects, and enhanced emergency preparedness and technology training. Dr. Swarat emphasized the need to continue improving assessment, alignment, and communication across divisions to sustain progress and campus-wide engagement with the strategic plan.

Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

- Romero asked for clarification on Goal 4, Strategy 3 of the *Fullerton Forward* plan regarding the university's presence in Orange County, specifically about the three units responsible for implementing it.

Dr. Swarat explained that while she didn't recall all three offhand, one is Government and Community Relations, and another likely involves Alumni Relations, as both serve as liaisons between the university and the broader community connecting with industry, alumni, and regional stakeholders. She offered to follow up with the full list after the meeting.

- Ryals asked whether there was a specific effort to promote more diverse faculty hiring across departments and colleges, noting variations in faculty demographics.

Dr. Swarat confirmed that increasing diversity in faculty and staff hiring is a university-wide priority included in the strategic plan. She highlighted recent progress overall faculty increased by 6.7%, while underrepresented faculty grew by 10%, and similar gains were seen among staff. She also referred to the Fullerton Data website for detailed demographic dashboards by college and department and noted that the VP of HR could provide additional insight on ongoing initiatives.

- Syed asked for clarification on goal three, specifically why the percentage outcomes for faculty and staff recruitment best practices appeared lower compared to others that were at 100%.

Dr. Swarat explained that the percentages reflect progress across multiple divisions and outcomes if one of three outcomes is not on track, it results in 67% completion. She added that the reasons vary by unit and cannot be shared publicly to maintain confidentiality but offered to discuss details privately if Syed was interested.

C. 2:00 pm: Phenicia McCullough, VP for Human Resources and Inclusive Excellence & Dr. Cecil Chik, Assistant Vice President, Engagement and Belonging

Chair Morales yielded to Phenicia McCullough, VP for Human Resources and Inclusive Excellence & Dr. Cecil Chik, Assistant Vice President, Engagement and Belonging.

McCullough thanked the group for the opportunity to speak and highlighted several HR initiatives. She recognized ASI President Haneefah Syed for receiving an Outstanding Leader Award at the recent leadership conference and shared updates on events promoting campus community and culture, including a new employee and student employee mixer aimed at fostering collaboration and student success. McCullough also noted the 20th anniversary celebration of the African American Resource Center and a wellness expo supporting faculty,

staff, and students. She provided updates on ongoing executive searches including the Provost, University Advancement, and two Dean positions and encouraged student involvement on search committees.

Dr. Chik followed with updates from the Diversity Initiatives and Resource Centers (DIRC). They announced programs celebrating National Coming Out Week, including a campus drag show and the inaugural Titan Pride Gala. Dr. Chik also shared plans for the grand opening of the Native American Indigenous Resource Center in November and noted increased student engagement and extended DIRC hours to better serve nontraditional students. Finally, Dr. Chik announced that the university received \$1.8 million through the CSU ASAP grant to launch APEX (Asian Pacific Excellence), a five-year leadership, mentorship, and coalition-building program supporting Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander student success. Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

- Syed asked whether the activities funded by the new grant would primarily be housed within the Asian American Studies Department.

Dr. Chik clarified that the program would operate collaboratively across multiple departments rather than being housed in one area. The grant will fund a full-time staff member in the Office of Engagement and Belonging, who will coordinate with Asian American Studies, Public Health, Education Leadership, and Housing. They added that this is the first time the campus has received this grant.

- Ryals asked how the pilot program for extended DIRC hours was progressing and how it might shape future plans.

Dr. Chik replied explained that the team launched a student survey to determine preferred days and times, with most selecting Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The pilot was implemented on Wednesdays, extending hours to 7 p.m. Feedback and attendance data are being collected to assess participation and determine whether to continue or adjust the schedule after the fall semester. Dr. Chik also acknowledged staff efforts for staying late to support the pilot.

- Dr. Jarvis suggested aligning extended office hours across campus to better serve students, noting that graduate studies already stays open later on the same days. He proposed coordinating so that key offices like financial aid and student services extend hours on the same days, ideally Tuesdays and Wednesdays, to make campus resources more accessible for commuter students.

Dr. Chik agreed, sharing that they've already coordinated with Dr. Patience Bryant, whose Black Student Success Space is open late on Tuesdays, while DIRC covers Wednesdays, ensuring balanced availability.

- Syed asked for clarification on the DIRC, HR, and OAB acronyms for new board members.

Dr. Chik explained that within the Division of Human Resources and Inclusive Excellence sits the Office of Engagement and Belonging (OAB). Under OAB are the Diversity Initiative Resource Centers, commonly referred to as DIRC, or Cultural Identity Centers. These centers, common in higher education, originated from ethnic studies and advocacy programs and serve as safe spaces for students from marginalized communities. At CSUF, they provide a physical hub where students can build community, access culturally relevant academic and personal resources, and engage in programming and mentorship in partnership with academic departments and faculty-staff associations.

Chair Morales yielded to Mahak Ahmad, ASI Governance Committee Chair.

Ahmad thanked the Governance Committee for their engagement in interviewing candidates and highlighted their meaningful discussions. For the College of Business and Economics, the Committee recommended Cesar Mendoza. Mendoza has prior experience as a governance ambassador for ASI, is familiar with policies and shared governance, and confirmed he can balance the Board role with other campus commitments. Quock supported his leadership and ability to represent the college alongside him.

Ahmad yielded to Dr. Dave Edwards.

Dr. Edwards added that Governance handles candidate vetting and interviews, making it easier for the full board to make decisions.

Chair Morales invited Cesar Mendoza to the podium.

Mendoza introduced himself as a sophomore finance major at Cal State Fullerton, has maintained a 4.0 GPA while actively participating in campus organizations like Alpha Time Vest, Main Club, and the Student Management Investment Fund. Professionally, he interned at Romero Wealth Management and Clara, a tech startup investment platform. He expressed excitement about serving on the Board of Directors for the College of Business.

BOD 022 25/26 (Governance Committee) A motion was brought to the Board of Directors from the Governance Committee to approve the resolution appointing Jennifer Tran as Director for the College of Education, effective immediately through May 31, 2026.

Chair Morales yielded to Mahak Ahmad, ASI Governance Committee Chair.

Ahmad shared that for the College of Education, the Committee met two highly qualified candidates and voted to recommend Jennifer Tran. Jennifer is active as interim president of SCTA, participates in Titan Future Teachers, and is part of the I am First Scholar and Fullerton Finish Program. She plans to focus on providing more career readiness and student teaching opportunities through partnerships with the Career Center.

Chair Morales invited Jennifer Tran to the podium.

Tran, a second-year Urban Learning undergraduate and first-generation student at Cal State Fullerton, expressed excitement for her new role. She is active in Titan Future Teachers (TFT), serves as interim president of SCTA, and participates in the I Am First and Fullerton Finish programs. Her goals include student wellness and career readiness, particularly by creating student teaching opportunities and partnerships with schools across all grade levels to prepare future educators.

Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

- Syed asked Tran to explain more about her recently introduced major on campus. Tran clarified that her Urban Learning undergraduate program is new at Cal State Fullerton and focuses on social justice in education, emphasizing the empowerment of underrepresented and marginalized communities. The program combines foundational educational skills with opportunities to uplift diverse perspectives within the classroom and broader learning environments.

Chair Morales opened the floor to discussion.

Chair Morales yielded to Mahak Ahmad, ASI Governance Committee Chair.

Ahmad shared that for the Natural Sciences and Mathematics college, the Committee had met two outstanding candidates, each with unique perspectives and strengths. After careful consideration, the Committee voted to recommend Isabel Soriano for the position. She provided background on Soriano's experience, noting her three years as a residential advisor, leadership in relaunching the Student Association for Asian American Studies, and efforts in community building. Ahmad added that she planned to advocate for increased research

opportunities, strengthen student-faculty connections, and recognize NSM students' contributions.

Chair Morales invited Isabella Soriano to the podium.

Soriano introduced herself as a fourth-year biology major with minors in Asian American Studies and Chemistry. She highlighted her experience in housing and residential engagement, including creating the Asian Pacific Islander South Asian American community as a resident advisor. She stated that, if selected for the ASI Board of Directors, she would promote mental health awareness and advocate for initiatives like the multilingual symposium.

F. Discussion: Budget Process Overview (Morales)

The Board will discuss the Budget Process.

Chair Morales yielded to Dr. Dave Edwards, ASI Executive Director.

Dr. Edwards thanked the group for completing the appointments, noting that ASI was nearly fully staffed with student leaders, a major accomplishment. He then shifted the discussion to the corporate perspective, explaining that the annual budget approval process for the next academic year, starting July 1st, begins in late winter and continues into the spring semester, and that the Finance Committee had received the information that will be shared with the Board today.

Dr. Edwards yielded to Kathleen Postal, ASI Chief Financial Officer.

Postal provided an overview of the budget's purpose, funding sources, and development process, highlighting that 81% of income comes from student fees and 19% from operations such as the University Conference Center, Titan Bowling and Billiards, Esports, and the Children's Center. She described how student fees are calculated each semester, noted recent and upcoming fee changes, and outlined the approval process, including departmental submissions, Finance Committee review, board approval, and university authorization. She emphasized that once the budget begins on July 1st, it is implemented, monitored, and

reported quarterly. Postal concluded that the budget ensures student resources are managed responsibly, allocated equitably, and directed toward programs that maximize student impact, with full transparency through publicly available financial information.

Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

There were no questions.

Chair Morales opened the floor to discussion.

- Dr. Edwards outlined the next steps in the budget process, explaining that Postal and her team, along with department directors, would develop their departmental budgets using historical data and projections through the holidays. After returning at the end of January, the Finance Committee would begin reviewing the information. Postal's team would compile it into a final draft, and the Finance Committee, with the AS President and Student Government Director, Hesgard, would prepare the combined student government and club budget. By early March, the proposed budget for the next year would be ready for consideration.

10. Reports

A. College Reports

I. EDU (Presenters: Mahak Ahmad)

Ahmad, representing the College of Education, introduced her co-director Jennifer Tran and shared updates on the college's clubs and organizations, including Club Teach, SCTA, and Autism Speaks U. She highlighted the Education Inter-Club Council (EICC) as a key body that unites student groups, fosters collaboration, and funds events and programs. Ahmad celebrated the college's milestones two decades of educator preparation, over 20,000 graduates, and the launch of the Urban Learning Program focused on social justice and equity. She outlined the 2024–2029 strategic plan emphasizing justice, equity, inclusion, financial support, and flexible pathways for students. Her goals for the year include expanding professional development, partnering with the Career Center for workshops and mentorships, advocating for extended weekend service hours, promoting ASI scholarships, and fostering cross-college collaboration. Ahmad also announced College of Education Week 2025, a week-long celebration featuring panels and webinars, and the Inquiry and Innovation Professional Learning Series, offering specialized workshops for teachers, alumni, and students.

Chair Morales opened the floor to questions.

II. ECS (Presenters: Yashwanth Mallareddygar, Armando Salazar)

Salazar and Mallareddygar presented the Fall 2025 report for the College of Engineering and Computer Science, congratulating new board members and introducing Interim Dean Dr. Sang June Oh, who succeeded Dr. Susanna Barua after her 37 years of service. They highlighted the upcoming Innovation Hub, a 42,000-square-foot sustainable facility set to open in Fall 2027 with specialized labs, lounges, and event spaces. They addressed student concerns about limited study spaces, bike parking, and tutoring awareness, outlining plans to secure temporary study rooms, add bike racks, and improve communication through a revamped social media strategy. Upcoming events include a Google career workshop, STEM Internship & Career Expo (Oct 16), Tech Expo (Oct 28), and Career Fair (Feb 18). Their key priorities

are enhancing student resources, expanding industry partnerships, and monitoring the Innovation Hub's progress. They concluded by emphasizing that the college is entering a pivotal phase of leadership transition, facility development, and expanding research and engagement opportunities.
